This month's newsletter has taken the form of news stories about people in years leading up to The Great War.

Census 1911

The members of the Parish are 631 Males 688 Females –in total 1319, being a decrease of 243 as compared with 1901.

1912 Fatalities to Local Men

Two young men connected with the district who had gone abroad have both died in fatal accidents. This Spring James Robertson, eldest son of the late James Robertson (for many years station master at Fountainhall and Stow) met his death in Vancouver while engaged in timber clearing when a blasting charge accidentally exploded. He had gone to the Klondyke some years ago prospecting for gold.

Mr Tait the Gas works manager received the sad news that his son John Tait had been killed in a railway disaster near Buffalo, U.S.A. Greater details of this distressing occurrence has not yet been received.

March 16th1912 Constabulary Change

P. C. Lumsden from Gilmerton has succeeded P.C. Wedderburn at the Stow Police Station, the latter having retired from the service. Immediately Before coming to Stow Mr Wedderburn was constable at Heriot and has been 20 years in the district.

1912 Trout Netting in the Gala Water

Roy Crawford residing at 2 Jane Place, Eskbank, Dalkeith was prosecuted in Edinburgh Sheriff Court on a charge of having in the Gala Water between Fountainhall Station and Burnhouse fished for and with a drag net 137 brown trout contrary to section one of the trout (Scotland) Act 1860. He pleaded guilty. Sheriff Graham imposed a fine of £3 including £1 expenses, with the alternative of one-month

imprisonment and ordered all equipment to be forfeited.

New Church Organist

Mr John Thorburn, teacher of music and organist, Selkirk has been appointed organist of Stow Parish Church from 20 applicants.

Memorial Window for Parish Church

There has been erected in Stow Parish Church a large stained glass window by Mr Wm. Ramsay of Bowland in memory of departed members of his family.

The window is the great west window consists of four lights and the subjects are striking scenes in the life of the Lord.
