## WINTER DRIVING - KEEP OUR CHILDREN SAFE

With the clocks having changed and the winter darkness fast approaching, we would like to take this opportunity to remind drivers to be aware of pedestrians and cyclists who also use our roads. Stow Primary School children wear high-vis vests so they can be seen. Please put your headlights on so they can see you too.

Be aware of your speed. Both Station Road and Mill Road are 20mph zones. Children and toddlers can be unpredictable so slow right down when driving past pedestrians. Although the A7 is 30mph maximum through Stow, a slower speed may be more appropriate for winter conditions. If residents reduce their speed then other road users would also have to.

Pavements are intended for pedestrians. Please do not park your car on the pavement and bring bins in as soon as possible after collection.

Well the archive has been busy in the past few weeks

On September 5 we all welcomed the arrival of the railway and the archive group were out with their cameras and recorders to mark the day. We took photos,

we chatted to people, we ate ice-cream. And now we are putting all that together into a booklet commemorating the day. That should be ready for Christmas so look out for that in the post office!

As well as railway commemoration we are, of course, noting the centenary of the Great War. The archive bought one of the London poppies and then decided that anything London could do, so could Stow. Two members of the group dived into the archives finding out about the names on the war memorial while we also decided to make a poppy display to sit beside the village war memorial. Red for each of the men who died and a single blue poppy representing the nurses who also lost their lives. We spoke to everyone in the community that we could, telling them what we were up to and asking about possible types of display. We then had the fun of making poppies along

the Steam Train pass by with Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II on board.
Another great day to be remembered and cherished!

Our Junior Road Safety Officers attended a conference in Galashiels to learn about their new role and started with a 'Be bright, be seen!' campaign. They have also recently run 'The Egg Challenge' to promote the importance of wearing a helmet when cycling.

We have had a very musical start to the year with violin tuition from Mr Jonathan Law, a guitar club after school run by Christine Armstrong and a weekly session of 'Trash Jazz' from Youth Music Initiative (YMI). The children will be showing off their new skills in a number of performances for family and friends of the school.

spotlight hat better time to have Wendy Ball in the spotlight than when she is on sabbatical from her six year, 21 issue stint as editor of this WENDY BALL Newsletter? Initially conceived to keep people informed about the opportunities and outcomes of the windfarm funds, the community newsletter was an idea Wendy successfully proposed to, and sought funding from, the Community Council. She then created, developed and delivered it, in what is her typical "want to make things better" approach. Once she has spotted a need or potential, for Wendy it's "hard not to get involved" and once she's taken on a responsibility, well, to paraphrase - once she's started, she'll finish!

Thirty years a Borderer (half her lifetime, as it happens) Wendy grew up in Shropshire, and from her early teens, throughout her first degree in Geography and subsequent teacher training,

maintained a keen interest in archaeology. This took her to archaeological digs in several Middle Eastern countries including Afghanistan, where she met her husband Warwick who had found his way there from Australia. Wendy and Warwick stayed in the Middle East and were living in Iraq when Wendy became pregnant with their first child. The couple felt the continuing Iran/Iraq war indicated it was not a wise place to start their family and returned to the UK in 1985. They needed to settle within commuting distance of a university with specialist collections for Warwick, and a source of international students for Wendy to use her skills as a teacher of

English as a Foreign Language. Edinburgh and the Borders fitted perfectly and the family (eventually to grow to three children) came to Stow via Redpath and Soutra, around 20 years ago.

Having spent six years teaching EFL in Edinburgh Wendy then became an early pioneer of the portfolio career. A golden thread running through all her work across several disciplines is of building connections; making a whole that is more than the sum of its parts. Her professional skills in education, social history and information management led to roles connecting communities; connecting professionals; and creating and recording living links between the past and the present. She also became very familiar with public authority funding quirks and all of this has benefitted Stow and Fountainhall. Having moved to Stow with young children she was keen to make contacts - to not live "in a glass bubble" - and so got involved in village organisations.

Over the years Wendy has: served on the Community Council; cofounded Stow Parent Council; co-founded Stow Kids After School Club; was informally on the committee of Wooplaw Community Woodland and co-founded and is currently Chair of Stow Parish Archive Group. As she takes a break from editing this newsletter to focus on a new venture linked to the coming of the Borders Railway, we can appreciate that Wendy is not stepping down, just aside and can also be sure that her natural curiosity and interest in developing links will ensure she remains actively involved, as always, to "make things better".
