## QUEST FOR COMMUNITY CHOIR LEADER - RESULT!!

hen Gala Water Singers learned in April that Jim Letham, our first and only Music Director for the six years' of the choir's existence, was resigning due to work demands elsewhere, we knew he would be a hard act to follow. Nancy Muir, who had worked with us occasionally in the past, offered to step into the Director's chair and lead us up to our winter concert 2017 to give us time to recruit a new leader - an offer we were very glad to accept. This term we have really enjoyed working with Nancy whose place in our story includes the gift of regular tongueand-vocal-twisting warmups alongside gently humorous encouragement which has been a great way to start each week. You can judge for yourselves at our concert on Sunday 17 December, 3pm, Stow Church, if we manage to pull off all the 'ring', 'sing', 'king', jing(le)', 'bring' - fest she's challenged us with - and not only those!

This year's concert programme is chosen from traditional, around the world and religious seasonal songs and carols with interludes of Clarsach and Recorder duets by our own Ruth Flavin and Nancy Muir - a combination new to most of us and which promises to be a treat.

After diligent efforts to recruit a new leader, including one singing workshop with a candidate in August which was



great fun but didn't result in a 'match' the committee discovered choir leading talent amongst Gala Water Singers and two of our singers, Julia Campbell and Helen Taylor, will be our Choir Leader and Accompanist respectively from January 2018 till May 2018, taking us to our summer concert. We'll then together decide if Julia and the choir feel we've 'clicked' and if Julia and Helen want to continue in their new roles.


Helen has been with the choir from the start and is well known to many through her involvement with junior drama and musicals in her home village of Heriot, where she is also the church organist. We greatly appreciate her generosity in adding us to her 'hats' and could not be more pleased to warmly welcome her as our Accompanist.

Julia joined the choir last year after settling locally with her family to run their family business in Burnhouse Mains and Middletoun. Julia is a music graduate of Edinburgh University who then went on to have a career as a Headteacher in primary education in the North of England. Fully trained in choral singing, Julia is experienced in directing choirs and in bringing communities together and teaches singing, piano and music theory privately. We are delighted to welcome Julia to the position of Choir Leader.

Tuesday January 16 sees Gala Water Singers' new term and if you've ever swithered about giving singing in the community choir a go, at the start of a new era for us this may be the time to give it a try - with no knowledge or experience of singing, or music, required at all. A slightly later start time of 7.15 pm, finishing at 9 pm with a short break midevening and breaks for the school holidays, may make it easier for some folk and we appreciate being accommodated in Fountainhall School once again. Should you need a lift to choir (or want more information) give John a ring on 01578 730289 and we'll do our best to arrange it. The first two weeks are free to try out, then costs are £50 a year paid in part each term (pro rata for joining during the year) reduced or waived if that's a problem.

Join us at our concert to close 2017 and maybe join your voice to ours to start 2018? People singing together - experienced or not, skilled or not, improving together - is what Community Choir is all about and is so, so enjoyable. Treat yourself.

This seems a good time to share some of the thinking about the newsletter by the editorial team (Wendy Ball and me so far) for 2018, but first a thank you to Wendy Ball, our Distribution Organiser for services above and beyond. Number 29 of SFCN was edited by me but laid out and sent to the printers by Wendy to help with a tight timetable. She not only made it easier for me to get away on holiday, she made the issue beautiful as always, as I'm sure you noticed. SFCN's first and founding editor, she hasn't lost any of her touch.

BUSINESS ENTRIES: some you will remember that several issues ago there were plans for a 'Business Extra' - a four page loose insert into the newsletter carrying a short entry for all locally-bases businesses. There would be no charge for being in the Extra, the intention being to let residents know what is available on the doorstep for our convenience and to support the local economy of self-employed and small businesses in our midst. Additionally it would expand the profile of our parish and as a copy goes on the Community Website, would provide a longer-lasting platform for business visibility. This received a limited response so did not go ahead but is something we'd like to do in 2018.

If you work for yourself, or run a small business and are based within Stow and Fountainhall Parish (local government) area, please contact the Editor to log your interest in being included in the Business Extra. When there are enough expressions of interest you will be contacted and advised of timing, space and style needs as the supplement is put together - likely to be Spring / Summer 2018. The broader and more accurate the Extra can be, the more useful it will be so please, do make contact now. An email to the editor (details below) with 'Business Extra Entry' in the subject line and your name, type of business and contact details within the text is all that is needed for the moment. Don't put it off - once you've sent that email, the initiative passes to SFCN and you will be contacted at the appropriate time for fuller information. Even if you have been established for some time, not everyone knows everything, and new residents do arrive fairly regularly so your business being in the Extra is a valuable connection.

Meanwhile, any new business which contacts SFCN will be given one mention, space permitting, to announce to the community that it exists and help them get established.

SUBMISSION GUIDELINES: by the next issue I aim to be able to send out a short sheet of guidance on sending information to the newsletter. This will include such things as a reminder to include essential detail e.g. contacts, and the best way for me to receive copy e.g. images as attachments, not in documents etc.

CLASH CALENDAR: this was floated two issues ago and received no response though verbally it receives support. Recently a community event in Fountainhall clashed with three events happening on the same evening in Stow; another Fountainhall event was affected by a clash with an event in Heriot - to the detriment of numbers attending each time. It should be technically possible to set up an electronic calendar so that it is easy to operate by registered organisations. If there is enough interest this can be explored in detail. If you'd like to see something effective and workable happen around this, please email the editor by Monday 8 January 2018 (details alongside) with 'Clash Calendar' in the subject line and your name, contact details and organisation within the text. If there is enough interest it will then be taken forward.

## A SNAPSHOT IN TIME - EX

fascinating exhibition based on the photograph collection of Gilbert 'Gib' McCall Miller, was staged by Gala Water History & Heritage Association on Friday and Saturday 17 and 18 November in Stow Town Hall.



Gib Miller was born in Stow on 13 December 1923 and having been introduced to photography by his uncle when he was young 'was soon capturing images of Stow and further afield and then returning home to develop the photos is his own darkroom'. He

had the good fortune to marry a lass, Jessie, from Leith and Jessie and Gib then settled back in Stow to raise their two children. 'Gib died in 2009 and was buried in Stow cemetery and left [this] legacy of photographs'. A careful selection from the 50s and 60s were on display creating that 'Snapshot in Time'.

The exhibition was curated by Dorothy Riddell, a long-time volunteer with the Archives who assists Mary Craig, the professional archivist employed by GWHHA. This is the first exhibition which has been wholly curated by Dorothy. Many congratulations to Dorothy and GWHHA on a very

NUGGETS FROM THE ARCHIVE

**Local Doctor fined: 1887** At Midlothian Justice of the Peace Court, Dr Middleton of Stow was found guilty of having employed a male servant and keeping a carriage at Stow railway station without obtaining a license. On questioning Dr Middleton stated that he had kept the carriage in order to save him [walking] the journey home after visiting patients in Fountainhall and Heriot. While it was accepted that he had need of transport home, the justice reminded him that as a professional man of some standing in the community his disregard of the need to obtain a license was a serious breach. He was fined £5 including court expenses with the alternative of one month's imprisonment.

spotlight t's not often that the chance comes along to interview someone who's completed over half a century as a volunteer post-holder on the

committee of an important local charity. Responsibilities for which they're well known and appreciated, but someone who is also smiling broadly and saying "I'm no

longer the Secretary, or anything else! At last, after 50 years, I've managed to pass it on." Mention Stow & District Pensioners Society in the same breath however and immediately the only person who can be in the Spotlight is Meg Stewart.

Meg's years of service to the Pensioners Society isn't just confined to her 50 plus years as a post-holder. She first joined the committee when she was not quite 30 years old at the request of her aunt and as the Pensioners Society couldn't imagine itself without her, she is still a committee member but without a designated role. All the organising, liaising, writing and reporting is now done by others, but Meg's rootedness in and knowledge of Stow

& District life in the 80 plus years of her life is too valuable to be given up by the society.

So things change, but also stay the same and that's a theme which rapidly becomes apparent in talking with Meg about her life. Repeatedly she says "it was ... then, now it's ..." and the amount of change Meg and her contemporaries have had to adapt to since the 1930s becomes clear in small ways as well as big ones

A sample: Meg's father was a Stow man and her mother from Galashiels; they met when Meg's mother worked at the Royal Hotel in Stow - now an empty wasteland; Meg was born in Stow in a house in The Brae - now called Earlston Road; attended primary school in Stow and then Roxburgh Street Secondary School in Galashiels - now merged into Galashiels Academy; and as a young woman Meg enjoyed singing in the choir of St Andrew's Church Stow - in whose footprint now stand two bungalows.

On leaving school at 14 Meg completed three years' training to become a darner in a Galashiels woollen mill (darners repaired damage done to bales of cloth coming off the loom; their skilled work saved wastage and loss of income for the mill and hence its workers) working there until her marriage to Rob, also from Stow. Soon they moved into Rob's parents' home in the village where they raised their two children. The house number was 12 later renumbered 50 in anticipation of more homes being built,

> but that didn't happen and the quirk remains. Rob was a local roadman employed by Stow's then Local Authority Midlothian County Council and while the village stood firm by the Gala Water, its local authority boundary skipped and Stow found itself in the new Borders Region in 1975 - itself replaced in 1996 by Scottish Borders Council.

Of course Meg also lived through a time of major change and was five years old when WWII began. As a small child she remembers seeing British soldiers marching through Stow and camping in Torsonce woods on their way to war - the garden by her home still has a concrete air raid shelter from that time, currently in use as a garden shed.

A life lived in Stow, bar a few years when her family needed her help elsewhere, Meg has also been happy to be on the committees of the Football Club and the 'Rural' (was SWRI now SWI). In her lifetime no longer are the Minister, the Headteacher and young adults part of Stow & District Pensioners Society Committee. It's now run by old folks for old folks and still thriving, providing a day trip in the summer, a Christmas party and a Sale of Work and Coffee Morning each year. Hers is a generation that just expected "to get on with it" and they still do.

Ask Meg about her motivation and she says "If people ask me to help, I always say yes. We're put here to help one another and it's a sad business if we can't." It's that responsiveness to being asked that enabled this interview. "I'll get ribbed for doing this" she laughed, "but you asked me if you could interview me for the newsletter and I like to help" so of course, she said yes. In her ninth decade - how could she not?
