THE HEART OF STOW

Stow Old School and Old Station: No further actions as agreements between stakeholders are being negotiated. (Community point of contact: Stow Community Trust Chair, Alan McNeilly).

Old Kirk. This phase of the repair work on the Old Kirk h as been successfully completed. A Windfarm Community Benefit grant has been awarded to contrue work into the second phase of consolidation. Discussions are on-going with regard to the Old Bridge. (Community point of contact: Stow Community Council Chair, Diana Muir)

Stow Park Drainage Project. Significant work took place during June to improve the drainage in the park. This work is still on-going as the area behind the Bowling Green, including the play area, is still to be drained. Anybody using it will be aware how the pathway remains wet and muddy. Also the wet area near and parallel to the A7 will not dry until work has been done on council road drains. This came to light during the park work. The council will schedule this asap. During the summer months SBC will be monitoring the grass germination and how the pitch is settling down. Any regrassing necessary will be done. The patch at the Manor Park end was not part of the original plan but the opportunity was taken to drain that area and raise the level. It is anticipated that the park will recover in time for the football season. (Community point of contact: Cllr. Sandy Aitchison)

STOW "COMMUNITY" POST OFFICE

Post Office Limited has been undertaking stringent reorganisation and transformation of the Post Office network in the last few years and it is now confirmed that Stow Post Office has been designated as a "Community Post Office" and so for the meantime is not under threat of closure. This

community status is based on the importance of the outlet in the community and the fact that it is the "last shop in the village". This status was by no means automatically granted and it is thanks to our sub-Postmaster's efforts that this excellent result has been achieved. As a "Community Post Office", Post Office Limited undertakes that the current Subpostmaster's contract remains the same. However, all of us need to be aware that this situation will be re-assessed from time to time and Stow Post Office will have to continue to prove its worth to the community - we all know how we can help!

STOW PRIMARY SCHOOL

Rowan Wemyss, Ian Houston and Nancy Wilson raised £92 for cancer research by running a bake sale at the end of the school day. The three youngsters all know someone who has been affected by cancer and decided to raise some funds. They did all the posters and most of the baking themselves. There has been a Post Office serving Stow Parish since the eighteenth century. The first one was at Stagehall on the old coach road. With the building of the modern road it was transferred to Stow in 1819 and was located on Earlston Road. A Mr James W. Sanderson, who was a printer to trade, took over the Post Office in 1886 and it was he who built the present building at Townfoot in 1896. The Post Office has been described as a business with a "powerful public purpose" and the present incumbents are true to this long tradition.

Alison Runciman

Alison and Stewart Runciman bought the Post Office in 2006 with Alison taking the helm as sub-postmaster. She jumped in at the deep end as she started at the run-up to Christmas, always a phenomenally busy time for the Post Office. Alison has a background in secretarial and administrative work and so the running of the post office was not as daunting as it might have been to some people. However, the challenge of running an efficient post office with its multitude of services alongside the village shop must be very demanding.

A typical working day begins at 6am with the early morning deliveries of milk, bread and the papers. From then on there are all kinds of things to be seen to such as making up orders for the shop, preparing for deliveries and overseeing the work at the shop and Post Office counters. Alison has seven local people working for her and she is rightly proud of her team. Apart from the day to day running of the business, Alison says every day is different because all kinds of customers need all kinds of things. There are pensioners making use of the Post Office's financial services; people popping in on their way to work for a snack and a paper; businesses sending packages and mailshots; people selling stuff on eBay; and at Christmas time there are loads of parcels winging their way all over the globe from Stow.

It must be difficult to be commercially viable in a small rural community but Alison has kept the business justified by being open to change, ready to try new stock and taking all the new Post Office services in her stride. She says she finds it a compliment when people come to the shop to look for something because they know that there is always a good chance that it will on the shelves. Alison is also very good at predicting demands and her window dressing often anticipates what we might like before we have thought of it ourselves.

In the time-honoured way, the Post Office under Alison's guidance is still the beating heart of the community. The staff are always there to help and will do all they can to promote community events and ventures. At the school a while ago, a young primary class were looking at the topic of personal safety. Their teacher asked them what would they do if they found themselves alone in Stow and unable to get home. Several answered that they would go to the shop. This is certainly no ordinary shop!

Many of us know of the unstinted generosity in time and help that the whole Runciman family give the community. Alison says they work as a team but even so there is a lot of work. Alison does admit that she thrives on being busy but she and her staff always make time to spare for all their customers. She thinks this is very important, "I treat people who come to the shop and post office in the way that I would like members of my own family to be treated should they come to a place like this and need help or to feel welcome. Elderly family members might need some help; the younger ones might need some advice or a friendly face; and the men might need some help in choosing a birthday card!"
