uncertain. The Community Council will monitor the situation.

THE OLD KIRK: Many members of the community have been shocked at the number of tombstones that have been laid flat by Scottish Borders Council in the Old Kirkyard. Whilst health and saftey considerations are very important, this action seems draconian. Several community groups have written to the Community Council and the CC have passed on the community concerns to the SBC in the strongest terms. The SBC have now offered reassurances that many of the tombstones will be re-erected but the timescale is

STOW STATION

As some of you are probably aware, the Stow Community Trust has been actively pursuing the possibility of taking over the station building and putting it to some use which would complement both the village and the railway once the latter opens next September. In fact it's almost two years since we first made contact with the Estate Manager at Network Rail and were given access to the interior of the building. This allowed us to measure up the size and layout of the rooms and to draw up very tentative proposals for what could be done. NR seemed to be impressed and gave us their support in principle, since which time we have had regular contact with them through the site offices at Fountainhall. However there has been no progress regarding the terms of a lease etc., although we expect this to be resolved, one way or the other, by the early spring, at which point we intend to call a public meeting. Even if no agreement can be reached with NR, there is still the possibility of setting up a Friends of Stow Station group, so a meeting will be called regardless. As we would like to establish a core email list of interested people, it would be helpful if you could contact either Bill Jamieson at sparrowcastle@btinternet.com or Alan McNeilly at A.McNeilly@ed.ac.uk

A further idea we have been pursuing is to establish a joint Waverley Route / Stow Museum and to that end an initial meeting has been held between the Community Trust, Stow Archive and the Waverley Railway Heritage Association (based at Whitrope). As the indications are that it is now unlikely any rooms in the building will be put to railway use, there would still be plenty of space available to use for other purposes. If you have any Waverley artefacts or photographs which could be made available, any of these community groups would be delighted to hear from you.

STOW PARK

When a child aged 8 says 'The park is rubbish because everything is for babies' it is perhaps time to re-evaluate what facilities exist. With only two swings for children of primary and secondary age there is certainly a dearth of play park equipment in Stow for the older child. SBC do not have any money for new playground equipment however they are happy to support a community lead project.

A group 'Stow Community Park' has been established to look into the feasibility of securing funding for engaging play park equipment for older children which will be located within the football park. This location will provide a focus for outdoor play away from the railway. The current play park would remain, it works well for the under 5's.

On a damp November day 59 young people expressed their disappointment at the current park facilities. The children have completed a questionnaire about the type of apparatus they would like, the result was very clear, something to climb on. The park is not just for children so we are hoping to secure enough funding for outdoor gym equipment for teenagers and adults along with a trim trail for both kids and adults. Many people have said they would like a path within the park so they can enjoy walking through it without getting their feet wet and some well positioned benches. We are speaking to Stow AFC and Stow Sports committee to ensure any new facilities benefit everyone that uses the park.

We are very much at the planning stage and would like to hear your views. There is a great deal of work to be done to turn this idea into reality and although to date we have received a lot of support, for which we are grateful, we will welcome anyone's help. Here's hoping that in the future we can all enjoy being in the park and not just walk on the pavements around its perimeter!

Bob Fleet

Everyone knows Bob! He was the one who introduced industrial quantities of pancakes at the Galawater Horticultural Society plant sales. Have you ever ended up with a tray of 20 birch or oak trees to plant? They will be from Bob. If you see a stall at any community event with wood shavings flying everywhere and



surrounded by lots of excited children (and adults) making their own wooden whistles and gypsy roses, that'll be Bob the Bodger. Have your children had a spookily fun time in Wooplaw woods at Halloween? That would have been organised by Bob. Stow Park floods and there's someone canoeing in the park - of course, that's Bob! These are just a few of the things that have Bob's touch - slightly eccentric, always enjoyable, always open to everyone.

Bob throws himself into all his activities with unquenchable enthusiasm and enviable energy but this conceals a long time of working very hard and seriously for the village community. The job as manager of the hospital laboratory at the Borders General Hospital brought Bob, Moira and their young family to Stow in 1989. The village was a very attractive place to live with an excellent school, two shops, a cafe, and a lively social life with a pub and two hotels. Stow was also ideal because it is here that Bob found a garden that had a house attached!

Having young children can help a family integrate into a community but also Bob liked to take an active part. He joined the PTA and later the School Board. He was a member of the Stow Sports Committee - instigating an enjoyable children's event that was much like a horizontal bungee jump and even a hot air balloon one year! Bob also resuscitated the Galawater Horticultural Society after it had been moribund for 13 years and he helped in starting up the Stow Parish Archive. Added to all of this, he was a member of the Community Council for a number of years, helping it develop into a more democratic group.

Perhaps Bob is best known for his work for our local community woodland at Wooplaw. He and the family discovered the woodland not long after they arrived in Stow and they then began to visit on a regular basis, as it is a marvellous place for children and families. Never content to sit back, Bob started to take an active interest and began to learn about green wood-working. He has gone from strength to strength and progressed to such a degree that he now has his own little woodturning business selling articles in 'The Crafters' cooperative in Melrose Square. He became a Wooplaw Warden and was a mainstay for many of the events held there over the years. He ultimately became chair and in 2012 oversaw the 25th anniversary celebrations of the founding of Wooplaw - which is the first ever community woodland in the U.K. Bob's great love of woodlands continues and he is now chair of the Tweed Valley Forest Festival. For him, life is full of endless possibilities - a series of what ifs? So Bob has a go and the community benefits.

On the subject of woodlands, over the past few years there seem to be stretches of trees growing up along the roadsides around Stow - they could be described as a kind of linear forest - does this look like the hand of Bob?
