WHO CAME HERE BEFORE US (AND WHAT DID THEY GET UP TO...)?

n June the SSE Toddleburn Wind Farm Community Fund awarded £11,250 to Stow and Fountainhall Community Council for a book on the history of the area, to be produced by a local historian.

The book will cover from the earliest known history of the area around 5AD to the present day and will include elements such as the right of sanctuary, the visits of various medieval kings, the weaving mills and the Victorian railway

system of which Fountainhall junction was an important site. Modern developments will also be included such as the recent wind-farms and return of the railway.

Material will be drawn from the archive maintained by the Gala Water History and Heritage Association, GWHHA, as well as from members of the local community. If you have a story to tell, be ready to share it!

The Station House

In June, the Trust were pleased to announce that the funding target had been reached, with contributions from Borders Railway Blueprint, Regeneration Capital Grant Fund (RCGF), Railway Heritage Fund, SCRF and BCCF. This

excellent news has given the project a real boost, and work has progressed at pace to appoint building contractors and engage the community in this exciting project.

Throughout May and June the Trust held a community survey, designed to solicit responses and opinion on how the spaces within the new Station House can be utilised. Over 100 responses were received, with the information collated and presented to Scottish Borders Council as part of the project development programme.


A SAD AND CAUTIONARY TALE

nyone who has seen the film 'Babe' (about a pig who herds sheep, for those who haven't) will remember the sheep's cries of 'WOLF' whenever a sheepdog comes to herd them. For sheep, there is still the terror of being hunted by a dog despite the domestication of both animals over centuries. It's those hunting instincts of a dog that farmers have harnessed, also over centuries, to produce the adaptation that is a sheepdog - a dog which can move sheep around without raising their fear to the level of panic. Even so, not panicking in the presence of a sheepdog is something sheep have to learn, and the sheepdog and shepherd use a skilled approach to help the sheep with that learning.



The young lamb in the picture was early in that learning when it, and its flock of young lambs recently separated from their mothers, experienced a 'WOLF' in their field. And it wasn't a sheepdog. Too inexperienced not to panic, they ran as far and as fast as they could to escape it. Maybe the dog was still on the lead; maybe it was at the edge of the field some metres away; maybe it was being carried? Still, it was a 'WOLF' and the lambs ran. And then they stopped running. WHAM! They'd hit a wire fence which toppled them and stopped them running. But it was the leaders who took that first hit and the rest of the flock couldn't see what was happening (blind panic does that) and kept running until they too went WHAM! - into all the lambs who had already fallen. There was running and falling and crashing and crushing until they couldn't run any more.

Afterwards, most were shocked and bruised; the one in the picture was in a worse state. Six weeks later, as we go to press, the cast has just come off the broken leg; how successful the healing will be known soon. One lamb had to be euthanased. There are not many weeks in the year when farmers hang notices on the edge of their fields asking dog walkers to please avoid this field for a specific time. Sharing space in the countryside between landowner and public is legal and not disputed. But sharing brings negotiation. Sometimes the needs of livestock mean a 'WOLF' in a field can cause tragedy when at other times in the year, a well-controlled 'WOLF' will not. If there is a sign at the edge of a field asking that dogs be kept out for a specific time, please respect it.

CURRENT, PAST & FUTURE FINANCES

here is currently £46,480.27 available in Longpark Community Fund and £27,444.40 in the Toddleburn Fund for projects benefitting the Parish of Stow.

It's now nine years since EDF's Longpark Community Fund was launched. Since then grants totalling £423,991.72 have been awarded from the Fund to projects benefitting many different aspects of life in the Parish, from preservation of local heritage and culture to sports opportunities and activities for children and families.

The Fund has supported projects costing £1,039,558.16 in total, so for every £1 awarded from Longpark Community Fund £2.56 was brought in from other sources. Similarly, SSE's Toddleburn Fund has awarded in excess of £300,000 since its inception eight years ago. A summary of awards made in 2018/19 is now available in their new Community Investment Report, available here: https://sse.com/communities/communityinvestmentann <u>ualreview/</u>. Previous years' reports are also available on this page.

In addition, in 2016 the Parish of Stow Community Funds Panel decided, after consultation with the Community Council, to invest some of the monies from both wind farm funds in a long-term 'community endowment'. This is a pot that should grow over the years to allow more local initiatives to be funded into the future, and potentially beyond the lives of the two windfarms. £70,000 has been squirrelled away in this pot, which is now worth £84,024.41! The endowment is managed by Foundation Scotland on behalf of the community.

Along with other Galashiels schools, Stow won the 2019 Ivor Goodsite Hoarding competition for their artwork showing why they love living in the Borders. Stow's hoarding demonstrated their love of Stow and the colours in nature around them. The hoardings can be seen on Huddersfield street in Galashiels.

The P6/7s raised an amazing £500 for Radio Borders Cash for Kids. Money was raised by selling toast and milk at break time. This social enterprise uses milk in glass bottles and palm oil free bread to raise money for different charities throughout the year.

Congratulations to all those who were awarded medals when the Braw Lad and Lass came to visit, also the competitors in the Borders School Chess

Tournament who came third.

The school was excited to welcome the BBC into the school. P7 pupil Pierre had entered and done well in their Young Reporters competition about the sustainability work he had been involved in. The BBC

showed and worked with the children to direct, write and do the sound and filming for reports. spotlight arvey maps definitely the best. Their level of detail for being on the hills is not like anyone else's.

For what I do, it's the map to use." Is this standard police issue? Um, not quite. 15 minutes into my interview with our Community Police Officer, PC Jamie Entwistle, and we're still talking animatedly about what he's been doing at the weekend, a weekend away from his day job as it happens, doing something he's equally passionate about and which provides an important balance to that very same day job.

Jamie has been taking part in... deep breath... an ultra distance mountain marathon. Sounds challenging? Oh yes. An ultra marathon is defined as any foot race longer than the standard marathon distance of 42.195 kilometres (26.219 miles) though they usually start from 50 km (31 miles) and there is no upper limit. Repeat, there is no upper limit. Jamie's weekend leisure activity involved taking part in a 30 hour mountain circular race over 102 kilometres (63 miles) beginning and ending in Braemar. (For comparison, the distance from Stow to Glasgow in a straight line, is around 90 km / 55 miles). Each contestant plans their own way round the

marshall-free route, including locating key markers placed in the terrain by the organisers (hence the importance of having the correct quality of map) so most of the time the participants are running solo. 30 hours includes overnight, so Jamie wasn't only running over the Cairngorms for almost 30 continuous hours, he was doing a lot of it in the dark. Anyone thinking of avoiding the on duty PC Entwistle by running for it had better have another think coming.

Inevitably I wondered how this passion developed and does it have any relationship to policing. While clearly it's a sport which makes Jamie fleet of foot and superfit, the ultra distance part crept up on him as his career in the Police Service lengthened, a career first suggested to him by his Mum when he was 16. Once that seed was sown it took firm root and with a future police service career in mind, Jamie took a degree in law, particularly relishing case law, where the practical application of any law on the statute books is formed through cumulative outcomes following argument and interpretation in the courts. This understanding that the law evolves through practice, was maybe an early indication of Jamie's approach to his current role.

When this Lancashire lad completed his degree 13 years ago, no police service in England and Wales was recruiting but the Civil Nuclear Constabulary 'the armed police force in charge of protecting civil nuclear sites and nuclear materials in England, Scotland and Wales' was, so that's where he went. After two years at Dounreay in Caithness Jamie and his wife decided they wanted to stay in Scotland, but closer to the M6 for visiting family in England and Wales. They moved to the Borders and Jamie joined Police Scotland, working in the

> Leith Response Group. When the chance to become a Community Police Officer in the Borders came up he was keen to transfer to that type of work and with an increasing family, cutting the commute was also important. In November 2018 Jamie became the Community Police Officer for the area north of Galashiels to the Midlothian border, which includes our Parish of Stow & Fountainhall.

Shifting from the Response Group to Community Policing came from Jamie's realisation that an aspect of his work that he valued was the chance to co-operate with others to make things better; to prevent crime as well as responding after there's been an offence. Crime could sometimes be prevented by working with local, concerned people to e.g. look out for vulnerable people or have time to chat with someone whose behaviour was becoming problematic with the intent of nudging them on to a path

that's better for them and for the community. This is very much part of the role of the Community Officer. Thinking back to the impact of case law on shaping how the law is ultimately applied, there are more ways than one of reducing crime and Jamie's interest lies, wherever possible, in being able at an early stage to open up alternative paths to building secure communities.

Completely in harmony with working with people concerned to improve their communities, Jamie's role includes leading the Borders branch of Police Scotland Youth Volunteers where 13-18 year olds meet weekly for training and then volunteer regularly at community events as part of a PSYV team. The final part of his PC role is the responsibility for Firearms Licensing across the Borders.

Being a Community Police Officer involves a great deal of contact listening to, talking with, liasing with, commiserating with, correcting, supporting - all kinds of folk and all kinds of happenings across Borders society. The contrast with hours running across wild land with no-one in sight is profound. Clearly for PC Jamie Entwistle it's a healthy balance that works.
