The entire Welcome Panel will be 2.5 metres x 1.5 metres; it has been cut up into five parts to make it easier to be worked on. There are five figures each representing part of the Borders


heritage. The Fisher Lass is in Eyemouth, the Shepherd is in Smailholm, the Textile Worker is in Hawick, the Monk is in Kelso and in Stow we have the Reiver. Through the five sections the Borders river system flows across the characters. On this occasion we added stitches to the rivers and started on the hill sections.

We were visited by a puppy training to be a guide dog for the blind who is being socialised in a variety of settings, he was very well behaved but did not add a stitch! A lady from Selkirk came to add her stitch and one novice stitcher said 'This is easier than trying to mend a hole in my trouser pocket!'

The Reiver will visit the Galashiels Girl Guides and Boys Brigade in the New Year (he's already been to the Galashiels Scout group) to allow them to add their stitches.

Thanks to Gala Water History & Heritage Association for letting us share the Reading Room. The Great Tapestry of Scotland Gallery is due to open in Galashiels in Spring 2021.

STOW PUMP TRACK SURVEY



We recently conducted a survey to help us understand the level of support for a bike pump track in Stow. Thank you to everyone who responded. We had 144 responses (138 online and 6 paper). 66% of respondents were resident in the Parish of Stow and Fountainhall.

Benefit to community?

85% of respondents thought a pump track would benefit the community and a further

7% thought it would maybe benefit the community.

Use?

- 52% of respondents said they would use a pump track in Stow and a further 17% said they would maybe use a pump track; 82% of respondents were aged 35 to 64 years.
- 81% of respondents said that other members of their household/ family or visitors to the house would or maybe would use a pump track.
- The majority of these other potential users were 18 years or below: 42% were aged under 12 years with a further 20% aged 12-18 years.

Location?

- 29% of respondents thought the pump track should be in the centre of the village, 17% at the edge of the village. 53% of respondents did not have an opinion about the area of location. 33 respondents added comments about location: the most frequently suggested locations were the park/ vicinity of the park (9 respondents) and the area of the land between the Bowling Club and Mill Lade (10 respondents).
- Important factors for location were safe to access on foot/ bike (65% of respondents), being near to the park and existing village amenities (45%) and visual impact (20% of respondents); 11% didn't have an opinion. 10% of respondents identified other factors that were important for location, the majority of which related to car parking close by or safe access from car parking.
- The majority of respondents would travel to the pump track by bike or foot (54%); 33% said they would travel by car.

We are holding a **community consultation event** to find out your views on a potential site(s) for the pump track on **Friday 13 December at Stow Town Hall** from 2.15pm to 4pm and 7pm to 8pm. There will be a short presentation at 2.30 pm and 7.15pm. Please come along to find out more and have your say. It is really important to get your feedback both to help decide on location and to support future funding applications. Refreshments and cake available! BEEING MORE BEE FRIENDLY . . .

By now, weather permitting, there should be 100 saplings of wild harvest trees and bushes planted at the quoiting green alongside the burn to create a beautiful hedge. They have been provided by the Borders Beekeepers Association who were very pleased to be able to include Stow in its tree planting project to encourage pollinators. They were/ will be planted by Stow's volunteer band of gardeners and planters. Over 400 trees were provided in a nationwide scheme organised by the woodland trust and shared among beekeepers in the borders.

Bees are finding it increasingly difficult to survive in the wild, mainly due to the varroa mite which came to Scotland the 1990s. Bees are vital for pollination of crops and wild flowers along with other insects such as bumble bees, wasps and butterflies.

There are over 100 members of the BBA. The association runs regular courses including very popular taster days and also the longer beginners course, which starts in February 2020. Details of courses and more information about the BBA's activities can be found on the website at www.bordersbeekeepers.org.uk.

Even if you do not want to become a beekeeper, you can help the bees and other pollinators by making sure you plant bee friendly plants in your garden, perhaps cut your grass a bit less often to let wild flowers flourish, you can also help to support bees in your area by buying local honey when it's available.

The Stow Community Trust has had a very active few months, with a public meeting to give an update on the Station House project, and our 2019 Annual General Meeting.

The Station House

The Station House project is an exciting and ambitious proposal to develop the existing station building into a bar/ bistro with cycle hub and community facilities. The project has been gathering momentum and is currently in the final stages before work can commence on-site.

Following a successful tendering process, the Board received a number of competitive bids for the construction work required to undertake the project. We are now working hard to close the funding gap that has arisen following this exercise. This involves working closely with our professional team and the preferred provider to identify savings, and with our funders to secure new monies. Further to this, The Accelerate Scheme which is run the by Scottish Community Alliance has allocated SCT the services of Pamela Redpath, a borders-based consultant to assist with financial planning.

We would also like to extend our thanks to Nigel Millar, who has very generously provided the use of his land for the additional parking provision required for the Station House. Planning permission has now been granted for the additional nine parking spaces which are above the station, west of the bridge, with the mature trees protected. We hope to be in a position to appoint a contractor for the construction work to begin early in the new year.

2019 Annual General Meeting

The SCT AGM took place in October and we were pleased to invite Jemma Reid (Project Manager, Midlothian and Borders Tourism Action Group) as our guest speaker. [And as many will remember, local resident Jemma was the volunteer organiser of a great party on the Quoiting Green on 5 September 2015, to celebrate the opening of the Borders Railway. Good to have your skills available to us again Jemma! Ed.].

Jemma provided an overview of what MBTAG have been doing and what they have planned over the next 12 months relating to tourism, opportunities and marketing. She also gave us an update on the new Scottish Borders Tourism Strategy and the work that is underway to develop the Scottish Borders as a place that people come to stay, rather than pass through on their way to other more favoured destinations in Scotland. Key to developing the Scottish Borders as a tourism destination is developing and marketing the full range of experiences for tourists in the Scottish Borders. We need to use available data to understand our potential visitors and their interests better as well as provide easily accessible information on the activities that are available in the area. Work has been done to gain insights into the people who are accessing information about the Scottish Borders online and what their interests are. By using this data we will be able to better provide a more comprehensive range of experiences that will meet the needs of tourists who are coming to the Borders.

MBTAG was set up by the Scottish Borders Tourism Partnership and Midlothian Tourism Forum on the back of the opening of

> the Borders Railway. During phase one the project focused on business-to-business support, encouraging collaboration to make local businesses more tourism ready across both regions-wide and not just down the railway corridor. This has included:

- developing a new tourism app 'Scotland Starts Here'
- providing online training for staff and managers
- providing training to support businesses to make their businesses more accessible to tourists online, as well as other routes to market including the travel trade.

Phase two of the project will focus on digital marketing, designing and building a new consumer facing campaign website that will inspire people to come to our destination. They are currently working on new campaigns, podcasts and ebooks that will also sit on the new website which will also be called 'Scotland Starts Here'

also targeting the travel trade to ensure this destination is on their itineraries and brochures by doing more inbound FAM (familiarisation

for industry professionals) trips and attending more trade shows than ever before.

Jemma concluded with her thoughts on the opportunities that the Station House Project provides to develop Stow as a destination for tourists. Key to this will be

working together to develop a whole range of tourism experiences in and around Stow, as well as collaborating with other neighbouring areas, ensuring that we're well linked into the work that is ongoing across the Borders to develop tourism.



SCT Public Meeting

At our public meeting in September we were joined by Lynne Marshall (Scottish Borders Council) who talked about the experience of setting up Just Cycle, a successful social enterprise in Tweedbank, which recycles bikes and promotes health and wellbeing through engagement in the project. SECOND AUTOMATIC DEFIBRILLATOR IN STOW WITH TRAINING INVITATION

Stow now has its second automatic defibrillator thanks to a Wind Farm Grant from EDF. This is positioned: on the side of a shed, at the side of the last house, on the south side and A7 end of Craigend road (see attached photos and map). The first defibrillator is still situated in the porch of the Town Hall.

The defibrillator is in the case which can be pulled open if required. The defibrillator does not require any training and gives full verbal instructions on how to use it when opened. Gillian Donaldson, the Lead Cardiac specialist Nurse at the Borders General Hospital, is offering to do some basic life

support training, which is used in conjunction with the defibrillator training, early in 2020 in Stow and Fountainhall.

TWINNING BETWEEN STOW-GALAWATER-HERIOT PARISH AND LUWATALA PARISH MALAWI

ong term links have been established between parishes here in the Scottish Borders and in Malawi - growing a sense of sharing and support between communities. Since 2009 Stow, Galawater and Heriot have been twinned with Luwatala which is a rural group of villages lying between mountain peaks south of Zomba. The community is isolated by difficult dirt tracks and lacks electricity or plumbing.

Three of us from Stow and Heriot Church went out to visit in October and the welcome and hospitality we received was awesome. We would like to share ideas and resources with Luwatala to help face some of the challenges in our communities. These challenges include an urgent lack of maize for the school-children and building a sustainable irrigation dam for future crops. Here we would love to learn more from the enthusiasm and faith of the people in Luwatala.

here does the time go? As always, it's been a very busy few months at Stow Primary School. Here are some of the things the School has been up to.

During the summer the new fitness trail was marked out in the playground. This makes an alternative to the Daily Mile and is well used by the pupils at playtime and out of hours as well. Each class has had Zumba sessions during lunch and now a well-supported football club is running twice weekly. Wednesday mornings start early for some who take part in the Box circuit session. Thanks to Miss Matthewson, Live Borders and Active Schools, for offering and enabling all these activities.

The House Captains have settled well into their roles of responsibility and leadership. Following the Harvest assembly they delivered the collected donations to the food bank in Galashiels. Thanks to all of you who came to the assembly and gave so generously. The House Captains took part in the Remembrance service at the war memorial, laying the school wreath; they attended the service at Galashiels Academy and then led the Remembrance assembly at Stow school.

The pupils have been busy out and about spreading their learning and new skills to the wider community. They attended Bang Goes the Borders to show how technology can be used to make sustainable choices by showcasing the Giki App. Having become one of the Zero Waste School Champions, an SBC/ Radio Borders video was made to promote the council's recycling policy. During Zero Waste Scotland Recycling week the School was featured on ITV's Representing the Borders where they explained their understanding of Climate Change. There was great delight when a letter arrived for one pupil from the Queen; he had written to her inviting her to come to Stow Primary and see the work the school does around sustainability! The School took part in the Great Borders River Clean. This was one of Scotland's biggest ever river cleans and 48kg of waste was collected

and weighed in Stow in just over an hour. It was great to see so many children, parents, staff and community members coming together to make the Gala Water a cleaner and safer river. Children continue to pass on information, tips and advice about the work they are doing by making videos. If you haven't already, have a look at the Stow Primary School Facebook page for ideas to alternatives for clingfilm, unwanted Halloween costumes and a greener

Christmas among many others. Please bring any unwanted costumes or Christmas jumpers into school where they will be swapped and reused.

This term the children have been looking at food waste and the impact on the environment. The Clean Plate Challenge was launched and any waste food is weighed for each house. The children apply their numeracy, measurement and data handling skills then interpret the data to make decisions around their meal choices.

We now know the winners of the *Plastic Free Awards 2019*. The school was one of three shortlisted in their category of Schools Champion, the only Scottish entrant shortlisted and a great achievement in itself. Stow Primary was a runner-up in its category. David Attenborough was the overall winner!

Back in September, the sun shone; the community and visitors turned out to the family Duck Race organised by the Parent Council. A fantastic £1000 was raised for school funds which goes to help the school to buy much needed resources and fund trips. The MacMillan coffee morning was an amazing success raising an incredible £762.30 for this very worthy cause. Thank you to all who came and supported it.

The School Christmas concert is on Tuesday 17 December where sustainable crafts will be on sale. All welcome. Look out for the next Community Café, a great chance to meet up with pupils over a coffee.

STOW PRIMAPL



Spot Island Revenue'; thinking '£gom was leader when it was in its infancy but 'uploading a photo' was a mystery... Often Ministers of the Kirk come to their calling at a mature place in life, with much that has gone before. In the case of the Minister of the Church of Scotland Parish of Stow St Mary of Wedale and Heriot Church, Reverend Victoria Linford, her tale weaves a story of modern commercial success alongside a deeprooted, lifelong Christian faith and independence of thought leading to her arrival in Stow almost ten years ago as our Parish Minister.

So, what's behind those comments which carry a hint of a fugitive from justice? They relate to the earlier part of Victoria's working life

when she was a corporate tax lawyer. How this Edinburgh born and bred lass became a lawyer was down to her very good Highers' results and being advised that she should therefore study medicine or law. As she had no vocation for medicine, law it was. What attracted her to corporate, rather than any other branch of law, is its complexity and international nature and on graduating Victoria worked in her speciality in a legal firm in Edinburgh. In time she became concerned about the ethics, despite the legality, of what she did in her working life, but some years and life events were to pass before reaching that point.

Only two weeks into the new job Victoria was invited to transfer to her firm's London branch - an offer she accepted with alacrity. A thoroughly enjoyable five

years followed as a young woman about town, relishing the mix of interesting work and a social life thriving on London's theatres, clubs and general arts scene until her mother became seriously ill and she returned home to Edinburgh.

Living and working again as a lawyer in Edinburgh, Victoria connected with St Cuthbert's Church at the West End; close to her office it was easy to help out in her lunch break. Because of its central location, St Cuthbert's congregation was often transient, people just passing through or dropping in, and it was a regular spot for a Big Issue seller. The reality of the struggle for some to have basic needs for wellbeing met was easy to see in this city centre church. A growing disconnect between Victoria's 'suits and champagne' lifestyle and her church work came to a head when one of her legal clients gave explicit instructions to sell his company and find a way to do it so that he paid not one penny in tax. The company sold for £100m with an initial tax liability of £10m and Victoria successfully completed her instructions. This was an epiphany for Victoria - surely, she thought, '£90m was ... enough for anyone!' - and she determined that she couldn't carry on applying her professional skills to exploiting legal tax reduction avenues for those who already had monetary riches, but an impoverished sense of social responsibility. She moved to work for a more socially orientated legal firm.

This chimed with changes in Victoria's church work and focus. She had become a church elder (part of the leadership of the Church of Scotland) led small, mid-week services within St Cuthbert's and later also worked in the evenings at a church in Gorgie in Edinburgh. For some time she had been having conversations with key

people in her spiritual life about applying to be a Minister of the Church of Scotland as her calling became clearer. Alongside this she was introduced by two 'mischievous friends' to a new entity, which was itself very new, an internet dating site 'Christian Connection' set up by and for Christians. As Victoria's friends were settling down and creating families and the average age of the congregations around Victoria was over 50 making finding a Christian partner difficult, Victoria was willing to give 'Christian Connection' a go. There were

only four men in Scotland registered on the site and immediately, Tim, now Victoria's husband, stood out.

Tim's profile photo showed him with his uncle and granddad and the line 'you can see what I'll become...'. Victoria was immediately taken with his honesty and humour and the couple got to know each other well by telephone before Tim even knew what Victoria looked like (those mystery 'uploads'). One unexpected area of compatibility was an interest in having a family by adoption. Within five years of meeting, Victoria and Tim married, Victoria was accepted to train for the Ministry and after the first year of her theology degree, two brothers who had not lived together until that point, Kieran aged four and Luke aged two, were placed with the couple and

the Linford family through adoption was born. Tim initially took adoption leave but never returned to work becoming full-time at home.

Qualified, and after a few months as a locum, the now Reverend Victoria sought a permanent charge (Parish). Our Parish had not been too long vacant and the information from the congregation of Stow of Wedale and Heriot Church sounded 'real, simple, colourful - and wanting a minister and a real person'. Victoria drove down from Edinburgh one day, walked around Heriot then Stow, then popped into the Cloudhouse, prayed, and told Tim she wanted to apply. Having reassured Tim in response to his queries - do they have hospitals and broadband? (the family were regulars at the Sick Kids Hospital in Edinburgh) - Victoria was successful in the selection process of the Parish and congregation and the family moved to Stow in the autumn of 2010.

Not everyone will call something a godsend and mean it literally. That's what Victoria says moving to our parish has been for her and her family. The church congregation is compassionate and committed and the village communities are nurturing places to bring up children and develop relationships which withstand challenges. Victoria's legal skills are now at the service of the local Presbytery but most essentially, her Christian belief of service - of being there for people and giving to people - is willingly at the service of us all.
