TUESDAY 25 FEBRUARY 2020 - THE START OF THE OLD STATION HOUSE CONVERSION



It has been a very busy couple of months for the Stow Community Trust. The good news is that in the run up to Christmas a sustainable financial package to bridge the financial gap caused by the increased costs from the tender bidding process was agreed. The contract for the building and construction works was signed with Swinton's Builders, Hawick just before Christmas. Work has now finally begun on the site with a completion date in September 2020. A meeting with representatives from the neighbouring houses and other local stakeholders about the practical arrangements for the building works was held early in January followed by a wider community meeting on Wednesday 26 February.



With the building works underway, the Stow Community Trust Board is now focusing its energies on the planning for activities in the building once it is completed. With the help of the local community we aim to have a name for the new Bar and Kitchen identified by the beginning of May. We're looking to find a name that will be meaningful for the local community, attract visitors from far and near and serve us well in years to come. Work is also underway to start the advertising and procurement for a tenant to run the Bar/ Kitchen.

We're also exploring the practical arrangements that we will need around the community room to ensure that it is a accessible community space that will encourage local people to gather and connect to do things together and pursue shared interests or activities; both serious and fun. Additionally, we have been in constructive discussions with Just Cycle, an established and successful Borders based social enterprise to extend their operations to run an outreach facility in the Station House.

We want to ensure that all the activities in and around the Station House will provide a well-integrated offer to the local community as well put Stow on the map as a great place to visit.

NEWS FROM GREEN STOW

Green Stow is a new(-ish) community group which champions and supports green and eco-friendly activities in and around Stow. This has included the amazing 'disrupters' group in Stow Primary School, who have been leading on the green agenda in a range of ways, most recently by innovating ecologically friendly Christmas crackers and promoting use of bamboo toothbrushes.

Green Stow's first public event was a Stow Primary School hosted talk on 30 January by Lorna Slater, co-leader of the Scottish Green party. Lorna gave a personal and deeply inspiring account of a trip she made to the Antarctic as part of a women's leadership course on climate action. Lorna related her first-hand experiences of the ways that global heating is affecting the region, but also gave a hopeful message of how, by acting locally, we can make a difference. She also showed lots of cute pictures of penguins! It was fantastic how many Stow folk came along and engaged Lorna with thoughtful questions and discussion.

Lorna's message seemed to have had an effect as there were several new faces at the Green Stow meeting on the following Sunday, all bubbling with enthusiasm for how the community can take action on pressing environmental challenges, with many ideas suggested ranging from litter picking to rewilding.

We will be continuing with the threads of those conversations at our next informal meeting, which will be on **Sunday 29 March at 11.30** in the Cloudhouse Cafe.

If you are concerned about climate change or environmental issues and want to do something to help that is practical, positive and community centred, please do come along to our next meeting. Hope to see you there!



At Christmas the pupils decided to make and sell sustainable crackers. This was led by three P7 pupils but involved the entire school community.

Younger pupils decorated the paper whilst older children managed the financial arrangements. Items were sourced or made and then ordered. The contents for them, sustainable of course, included – seeds, a hat, a pledge and a sustainable item such as homemade soap, bracelet, or puzzle. Orders were taken in advance via email/ order forms and the school community helped to assemble them.

Pupils then voted as to how to spend the healthy profit. It was decided to send it to help animals suffering as a result of the bushfires in Australia.

The 2018-19 station usage figures for the whole of Great Britain were published by the Office of Rail and Road (ORR) in early January and these show a small but significant increase in patronage at Stow - I say significant because part of the period covered was badly affected by train crew related cancellations and it would have been no surprise if passenger numbers on the Borders Railway as a whole had actually dropped. To be more exact, there were 71,222 recorded entries and exits here, an increase of just under 2% compared with 2017-18. All the Borders Railway stations showed an increase except for Newtowngrange where there was 1.8% drop in patronage. Interestingly, Shawfair achieved a very healthy 30% increase, but still lags well behind Stow at 41,138 entries and exits, and one does wonder what the justification is for Shawfair being privileged with the full service while 18 of these trains whizz through Stow without stopping!

The indefatigable Bill Jamieson, who did so much as part of the Campaign for Borders Rail to bring about the return of the Borders Railway (see Newsletter No. 22, Summer 2015) continues to keep an eye on the progress of the service.

The Parent Council made sure that their fundraising efforts were sustainable again, creating table centre pieces and wooden snowmen with the pupils.

The school play - Cinderella Rockafella - a modern twist on the original, was a whole school pantomime. A massive achievement that brought all ages together to create a hilarious show that was once again incredibly professionally done from the songs and costumes to the scenery and acting.

Over the past few months pupils have been discovering the importance of reducing food waste. As a direct result the clean plate challenge was initiated. Waste food from lunch is weighed and recorded each day and statistical analysis ensues; the children are engaged and utilise fundamental skills in their work.



A year ago this newsletter was able to report in optimistic terms on the prospects of all trains stopping at Stow with effect from the May 2020 timetable change. Unfortunately any hopes of this happening had already been dashed before 2019 was out when ScotRail's Scott Prentice emailed the following to Fraser Simm and myself:-

"We did develop a timetable with a half hourly service at Stow but it was rejected through the verification process because it was considered that the extra calls made the timetable across the whole route unacceptably poorly performance (sic) (ie. more trains would be late each day).

*As you are aware the Scottish Government served ScotRail with a Remedial Notice earlier this year because performance on the East Coast routes had fallen to unacceptable levels. The reliability of service is improving but is not yet at the level which customers expect and deserve. **We still want to provide Stow with a half hourly service** (my emphasis) but now need to find a way of speeding trains up so that the time of the extra call can be incorporated without worsening the service reliability for all customers on the route. There are a number of projects underway which will enable this to happen, I'm just not confident enough of the timescales for their completion to advise when we might be able to introduce the additional calls.*

I apologise for the disappointing news and assure you that we will make this happen."

This is certainly disappointing but hardly surprising given the poor - at times abysmal - performance throughout 2019, not least the number of crew related cancellations which continued to be an issue into the autumn (although this seems to have been resolved from the December timetable change). The main 'way of speeding trains up' referred to by Scott is almost certainly the remodelling of Portobello Junction, which I understand will raise the speed restriction for trains joining/ leaving the Borders Railway from 15 to 40 mph. In conjunction with full operation by class 170 diesel multiple units, this should easily permit the necessary time savings to be found.

The bad news is that the remodelling of Portobello Junction (which has been under discussion for at least 15 years to my knowledge) is unlikely to take place until 2022-23, but hopefully more 3-coach class 170 units will become available during the course of 2020, allowing the remaining 2-coach (and ageing) class 158 units to be replaced.

The latter being the case, I find it difficult to see why some incremental improvements could not be made before Portobello Junction is remodelled - for example the half-hourly frequency northbound could be extended into the late morning with just two additional trains calling at 09:11 and 10:11. Similarly, additional calls at 15:39 and 16:39 southbound would give a half hourly frequency from Edinburgh commencing in the mid-afternoon. To my mind such changes (which I have already suggested to ScotRail) would target the periods of higher demand during the off-peak, and as such would constitute a significant improvement in the service at Stow, but it would be interesting to know what anyone else thinks.

## STOW PUMP TRACK UPDATE



A huge thank you to all the people who came to the Stow Pump Track Community Consultation event in December. It was great to see so many people turn out on a Friday only two weeks before Christmas. Both the afternoon and the evening sessions were well attended and we had 75 responses to our consultation questionnaire. The purpose of the community consultation was to provide more information about the plans to have a pump track in Stow and to ask the community what their preferred site was. Only two sites had been identified as potentially feasible for a pump track from an options appraisal of 8 sites. Site 1 is the land between the Bowling Club and Mill Lade and Site 5 is the land between the football pitch and Mill Road (where the tents are for Stow Sports week). The results from the community consultation identified Site 1 as being the preferred site (84% of respondents preferred this site).

Both sites are on the flood plain as identified by SEPA. Early discussions with SBC's Flood Risk Engineer informed us that it is possible to build a pump track on a flood plain provided that it does not increase flood risk. Hawick Community Pump track recently have been granted planning permission and funding to build a pump track on a site with the same flood risk as the Stow sites.

We have had further discussions with SBC and now have permission to undertake the surveys, pump track design and flood risk assessments that would be required to assure SBC, the pump track group and wider community that the pump track, if built on Site 1, would not increase flood risk. This information will also be required for a planning application. We are also looking to see how we could, if possible, reduce the existing flood risk at Site 1. We have applied for funding to cover the costs of the surveys, design fees, flood risk assessments and planning application.

If successful in our funding application a user group will be formed to input into and be consulted on the design stages. We already have a number of young people who have volunteered to be part of this group but the group is open to anyone who has an interest in the pump track design. There will also be a further community event to provide an opportunity for anyone interested to see the final design.

Singing. Singing with others. That's one of the strongest strands running through John Wilkinson's life and one that he's enabled others to share through co-founding Gala Water Singers in 2011. The idea for the community choir came a couple of years after then local minister Catherine Buchan and her family left the area in 2009; Catherine's husband Alan was the church organist and choir leader and the choral gap he left remained unfilled until, at a gathering of the 'old' church choir, Nettie Simm (in the Spotlight in Newsletter No. 33, Autumn 2018) had the idea for a community choir. John and Paul Baxter (a Heriot man, so, for the moment, not able to be featured here) followed this up and learned that Hawick High School's well-known Principal Teacher of Music, Jim Letham, was about to retire. Jim was approached, responded positively, and a couple of 'Come and Sing' events took place in the valley in the summer of 2011 leading to over 50 people enthusiastically joining the new Gala Water Singers Community Choir when it began in August 2011, meeting in Fountainhall. John became Chair of the committee, a position he still fills.

Gala Water Singers is just the latest singing ensemble in John's life. He's sung with school choirs, church choirs, rugby... groups, Melrose Amateur Opera Society until it stopped performing in 2015 and now Gala Water Singers. As it's been 52 years since he moved into the valley, he's also been singing alongside some members of the community choir in one singing group or another for around half a century - a quite amazing record (oops, no pun intended) indeed. So how did John come to be in the Gala Water valley?

In 1968 John and his wife Allwin were expecting their second child while living in a room and kitchen in Edinburgh. They looked for somewhere they could afford for their increasing family (to become four children in all) and found Stow. They appreciated the old traditional village and John reckons they were one of the first commuters to move to the area; John was a medical representative at the time and a car and fuel allowance came with the job giving flexibility to where home could be in relation to work. Both John and Allwin were used to living close to the countryside in Dumfriesshire and Fife respectively, having met in Edinburgh during post secondary school education, so rural living suited them well. They also inherited a unique part of Scotland's literary history. The Wilkinsons live in part of Galabank (on the A7 one mile north of Stow) which was built as an old droving inn centuries ago - exactly when is not known. However, on a date sometime in the 1780s/90s, Robert Burns, Scotland's National Bard, was staying at the inn when he penned "The Braw Lads o' Gala Water" - the first verse of which he inscribed on the window pane of the 'best' upstairs room. Sadly it is no longer there but there are authentic witness accounts to the truth of the story. In less busy times

the school used to bring the children to see it and the song is now part of Gala Water Singers' repertoire.

John describes himself as someone who likes to follow his own direction and drive forward what he wants to see happen. This has often happily coincided with bringing benefit to our local community with many examples over the past half century. An equally strong and long thread in John's life is outdoor activity and it's perhaps not surprising that he was a co-founder of the Gala Water Outdoor Activity Club, initially a canoeing club in Stow for young people and families who wanted to be active outdoors. The idea came first, then the funding efforts and grant applications, acquisition of canoes though adults and young people building them together, life-jackets and - finally - the instructor skills to safely teach youngsters. The club then moved on to developing orienteering in the area and, over time, was proud to have seen five junior orienteering internationalists come from



its ranks. Hill-walking too flourished from within the group and is still going strong today (see last Newsletter No 38, Winter 2019-20). At one time, John estimates about 10% of the village were members. John is still chair of the club but nowadays 'committee meetings' are more likely to be talking in a bothy than a hall - much more John's style. Typically, after successful cancer treatment last year, he not only still walks with the club, he is leading walks for Macmillan Move More Borders for people recovering from cancer as part of their healthy living and recovery.

Casting his mind back to previous community involvement John can bring to mind: a spell on the Community

Council; starting up the first Parent/ Teacher Association with the then head of Stow Primary School, Derek Jones; volunteering with Borders Samaritans in its early years; being on the Board of Management of Stow and Heriot Church and a Panel Member of the Children's Panel for the Scottish Borders.

As someone who professes to find 'just sitting around talking' frustrating, preferring to 'get on and do' things, John has spent a lot of time planning and working with others to make things happen; to drive things forward in concert. His career in sales and working for The Shaw Trust negotiating work placements for people with disabilities which John describes as 'a sheltered workshop without premises', involved making connections with many people to understand their needs and see how or if he could help. That enjoyment of people and a wish to help while remaining true to his own path has benefited our area over many years and paid no little part in shaping our community life. We're fortunate that John is still keen to follow up and make happen anything he cares about and considers important. We can all stay on song with that!
