
Remember the trees in Stow park that had to come down because they were unsafe, back in 2018?

An elephant crossed the valley...



The parish of Stow lies in the Wedale Valley and its history is the history of Scotland in miniature. Historian Mary W. Craig has written a new book, 'An elephant crossed the valley: the Wedale Valley through the ages'.

Scotland has grown from a sparsely populated land of local tribes to a country with global connections. Wedale has mirrored that change, evolving from part of the Votadini tribe's territory to a modern community with international residents. The valley has links with significant historical figures and events, cultural innovations, and scientific breakthroughs.... from King Arthur to Dolly the sheep.



STOW BOWLING CLUB: Bowling Club loss


t is with great sadness that the Stow Bowling club lost one of it's finest bowlers recently. Walter Hunter sadly passed away last month.

Walter will be remembered for winning the Men's Club Championship 10 times, from 1974 to 2005. When he won the Men's Club Champions competition in 1986, he entered the Champion of Champions Competition, for bowling clubs across the Borders. Walter won in 1988. In 1990, Walter represented the Borders at the prestigious Ayr Bowling Green in the Men's Singles. Playing at Ayr is every competitive bowler's dream. George Burns, the Stow Bowling Club's President at the time, presented Walter with a crystal decanter for his great achievement. More recently Walter was unable to play but would be seen on Station Road watching all the competitions from his car. He will be

EDF Longpark Wind Farm Community Fund Awards

The EDF Renewables Longpark Wind Farm Community Fund has made two recent awards.







Stow Community Trust has received £7,500 from each of the EDF Longpark and SSE Toddleburn Funds to kick-start Stow's first Community Action Plan.

Together with £11,000 from Scottish Borders Council, the grants will enable the Trust to recruit a freelance Community Development Worker. They will conduct in-depth discussions with people right across the community, from local actions to tackle climate change, new ideas for community facilities or what younger people want to see in the area. Everyone will have a chance to have their say.

The consultation work will help determine what activities community groups can potentially take on themselves or work with others to achieve. The resulting plan will provide a community resource to influence future strategies and priorities, triggering new projects and celebrating the contribution of existing local groups.

With access to community benefit funding from both EDF Renewables, Longpark, and SSE Toddleburn wind farms, the community can drive forward those projects and services which matter most.

A resident reference group has already been formed to support the activities and ensure inclusivity across the community supported by the Community Council. For more information see:

COMMUNITY COUNCIL NEWS

The Parish of Stow Community Council covers both Stow and Fountainhall. The following update is from matters arising at recent zoom meetings.

- I Jack Mackenzie has resigned from the community council after many years of hard work, including currently as co-chair. He will be missed and we would like to thank him and wish him all the best. Stuart Jeffrey is now co-chair with Charlotte Hendry. We are welcoming Gordon Stewart, who is bringing us into the technological age. He is upgrading the Stow Website. - The community council currently supports 11 projects. The Old Kirk and The Bishops Palace are now complete and Robin MacMillan is improving the Subscription Bridge for us.
- Speeding through Stow continues to be a concern, with speed signs only recording speeds below 28mph. The police will only position cameras at the south of the village.
- We have been pleased to see local residents at our zoom meetings, raising various matters including bonfires. These can be a nuisance to neighbours. The SBC website has a link with guidance about bonfires www.scotborders.gov. uk/info/20052/environmental_problems/93/bonfires_and_burning_outdoors

- Scawd Law Windfarm (proposed site at Walkerburn) have been attending our meetings to update us on the proposal (at pre-planning stage). We have also had regular attendance about the logging lorries from Watherston Forest going through Fountainhall.
- For anyone struggling financially, we have hardship funds from the wind farms. We can pay up to £150 to cover basic necessities or towards large unexpected essential bills. This is completely confidential and all decisions are made by the four office bearers. If you want to apply, please contact Jenny Mushlin (see below).
- We are hoping to go back to face to face meetings in either Fountainhall or Stow on the first Monday of the month soon. Check Stow website www.stow-borders.co.uk/. ■ We are still working to identify a tenant/operator for the Station House. It is a hugely challenging time for the hospitality sector and we have been clear from the outset that we need to get the ideal team. We continue to work to get it right.

■ The development of a Community Action Plan will start soon when we appoint a Community Development Worker. We will be reaching out to get the views of everyone across the Gala Water valley about projects and activities to make this an even better place to live and visit.

■ Our walking activities are going very well. The Tuesday and Thursday Walk It groups have been great fun with many new friendships formed. Everyone is welcome - Tuesdays at 12.30, meeting at the Station House for a briskish 45 minute walk, and Thursday at 10.30, meeting at the crossroads for a gentler stroll, finishing with a coffee at the Cloudhouse.

■ The new ebike trials have proven successful, with more ebikes delivered over the past few weeks. VIRTUAL STOWED OUT 2021



News from Stow Health Centre

Repeat Prescription Ordering

Stow Health Centre is currently phasing out telephone repeat prescription ordering, by asking patients to order their prescriptions by either


- a) handing in their repeat slip (or a piece of paper with a note on) with their request into the post box on the outside of the surgery, or
- b) by signing up for Patient Access. Patient Access is an App that enables patients to order their repeat prescriptions online. If you have not already signed up for Patient Access, then please check out the website www.stowandlauderhealth.scot.nhs. uk and look under 'Prescriptions' to download an application form. Hand this form into the Health Centre and a PIN letter will be issued which will allow you to register www. patientaccess.com

As you can appreciate, our telephone lines need to be kept free for patients who need help in urgent or emergency circumstances and/or patients trying to make an appointment.

As a practice, we were answering around 200 telephone prescription requests per week, taking up valuable reception time. We hope this explains our need to phase this out. There is a 4-working day turnaround for prescriptions. We appreciate your co-operation.

With the phasing out of telephone orders at Stow Health Centre, Fountainhall Resilience is organising their own phone-in service, extending the existing prescription delivery service for Fountainhall and Heriot.

Stow residents struggling with the new process can use this service too.

Currently a volunteer delivers repeat prescriptions to Fountainhall and Heriot every Friday to those who cannot get to the surgery. This will now extend to collecting repeat prescription forms. A volunteer can collect forms on a Friday.

Stow won the Schools Champion Category in the Surfers Against Sewage Plastic Free Awards. This prestigious national award was judged this year by, among others, Richard Walker, Lucy Siegle and Liz Bonnin. We join Sir David Attenborough and Afroz Shah as past recipients of their awards.

As the station house nears completion, we have been speaking to one of the drivers of the community trust project. Helen Corcoran, Chair of the Stow Community Trust and secretary of the Stow Community Park committee, has a long association with the village and as we discovered, is a very busy person.

My family came to Stow in 1977, to take over Millburn Garage, when the Fairgrieves retired. I was a student at Newcastle studying Fashion and Business. When I left college, I joined Selfridges as a management trainee and moved around the country managing Miss Selfridge stores. Then it was homeware and Habitat... I was a store manager and I worked with the group until it folded. Had I known in the seventies there was such a thing as an interior design course, I would have done it!

What brought you back to Stow?

After 30 years in Pearl Assurance, my husband took redundancy. We moved to Gullane and bought and ran Goose Green Bakery and Cafe. Then we came to Stow with our two children. My brother Hamish who lives here built us a house.

I love Stow it's big enough but not too big. I've met lots of people, got involved with community groups and through the children have made many friends. I have been heavily involved in the community park committee. It has been a real learning curve. I gained a huge amount from being part of such a massive community team effort.

And then you got involved in the station house project ...

None of us realised just how much it was going to take! It actually all started many years before the train line was re-opened. Previous Trust members contacted Network Rail and Transport Scotland and did a tremendous job preventing the building from being flattened. Trying to work with Network Rail is rather like working with the secret squirrel society. It's taken years and years to find out even the simplest things.

How much of a local enterprise has it been?

We really wanted to focus on using local tradespeople. Our architect, Ben Glennon, lives in the village as does Andrew Mackenzie, the artist who's lithographs have been reproduced on the walls in the dining room. We also want to hear as much as possible from locals who remember the station from before 1969. It would be great to use their stories and to show them what we've done. I know of someone from Transport Scotland who was brought up in the station house, his father was the station master.

How difficult has it been to get to this stage?

It has been a real team effort, hard work but well worth it. Several members of

the Community Trust, past and present, have done a tremendous amount of work behind the scenes. Bob Howarth, Eibhlin McHugh and Grace Murray deserve special mention.

What is your vision for the station house?

I hope it's going to be a really vibrant place, run by a great chef and host.
I see the bar and restaurant being somewhere everybody wants to come and meet, for business, private events, discussions or meetings. I want it to be a fantastic place to see all your friends and family. It needs to be good enough to attract people from outside yet accessible enough for locals to use on a regular basis.

When is it going to open?

That's the 6 million dollar question! As soon as we get a tenant, it will be open. There has been much interest but we haven't yet found the right people. We may in the meantime do some events here with outside caterers. We want to make sure that the tenant is part of the community and knows what happens here, gets involved with events, musical and artistic.

And what's next?

Now we've got the experience of being able to fundraise, know who to go to, where to go and who to get together; the Community Trust has many other projects in mind, for example the old Royal Hotel site.

Has the station house been a labour of love?

Absolutely .. It's taken much longer than I thought, partly because of the pandemic. But I think it will completely change the whole atmosphere of Stow. It's going to give us all somewhere to socialise, it's going to be the impetus to lots of other things. It's a brilliant catalyst and I think it will bring more people to Stow ensuring that other businesses thrive. My vision is to encourage sustainable self supporting ventures that benefit Stow in the long run.



Stow Resilience is looking for volunteers. There is still a need for people to help occasionally. It is not a regular weekly commitment, just
